Voters also play a crucial role in determining Town and School budgets by participating in both Annual Meetings. The Annual School Meeting is scheduled for Saturday, March 9, at 9 a.m., and the Annual Town Meeting will take place on Saturday, March 16 at 8:30 a.m., both are held at the school. Remember, you must be a registered voter to vote at these meetings. The last day for pre-election voter registration is March 2. You may also register to vote on Election Day, March 12.

We urge residents to complete dog licensing early, with all renewals required by April 30. After licensing, remember to participate in our Top Dog Contest by sending a photo to townclerk@strafford.nh.gov.

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CONSERVATION NOTES

Bear-Paw Regional Greenways held its annual meeting on February 17 at Coe-Brown Academy. The featured speaker was Dr. Pamela Hunt, of NH Audubon, who offered her expertise on New Hampshire's many bird species. Following the meeting outreach members Karen Festa and Tom Eid led a guided walk at Northwood Meadows Park. I was able to attend the meeting and found it enjoyable and informative. It was good to be around so many people with a heartfelt interest and dedication in conservation efforts.

It should be interesting to see the results of the NH Fish and Game wild turkey survey. My observations, as well as those of others I have spoken to, indicate a dearth of turkeys despite the mildest of winters. We also had an excellent fall mast crop of both acorns and beech nuts which comprise an important part of the bird's diet. The 2023 survey showed an increase in numbers from the previous year with 835 flocks totaling 15,098 turkeys, an average of just over 18 per flock. About three quarters of sightings were at backyard bird feeders, followed by corn and grain fields, then acorns and beechnuts. I saw precious few in drives through Strafford and surrounding towns and very few tracks during numerous woodland hikes. Some of the factors that can affect turkey population detrimentally are excessive rains during nesting season, avian pox, poor mast crop and prolonged cold snaps with deep snows that limit their movements and access to food sources. The survey also features a pie chart of public attitudes towards turkeys and they are welcomed by the vast majority. Here's hoping their numbers are up this spring.

While the growing season is still a way off, the U.S Department of Agriculture has recently released new maps to help gardeners decide what plants can thrive despite the lowest winter temperatures in their location. Southern NH is now in a warmer zone. According to Steph Susinski, Head of Home Horticulture Program at UNH Cooperative Extension, "Peach trees have even more chances of not getting hit by winter injury at those deeper temperatures because we are not experiencing those deeper temperatures as often." Any good news about peach season is welcome after last year's scant harvest due to other weather-related problems.

The Strafford Conservation Commission's Annual Report has been completed and will be available in the Annual Town Report. We hold our meetings at Strafford Town Hall the first Monday of each month at 7 p.m. and encourage anyone with an interest to attend.



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CHINESE NATURAL HEALTH

Chinese Clock: Our circadian rhythm, or sleep/wake cycle, is our 24-hour internal clock. When the light changes in our environment due to Earth's rotation around its axis, this biological clock regulates our cycles of alertness and sleepiness. During the first four months of baby's life, the circadian rhythm is established with perceptions of day and night. Babies experience rapid physiological changes, including body temperature, the production of melatonin and cortisol, which allow an infant to establish a circadian rhythm that is stable.

As we grow and develop, our circadian rhythm may suffer disruptions which can have health implications for multiple organ systems. Our immune, reproductive, gastrointestinal, skeletal, endocrine, renal, and cardiovascular systems can suffer from a disturbed circadian rhythm.

Similarly, Chinese medicine portrays a Chinese clock: an ancient info-graphic of our body. The Chinese clock describes how energy (Qi) moves through our organ systems in a 24-hour cycle. From 5 a.m. to 7 a.m. Qi is flowing through the Large Intestine. This is said to be the best time to wake up and start the day. It is a wonderful time to exercise your body and move your bowels. The Qi moves to the Stomach from 7 a.m. to 9 a.m., and one should have breakfast during this time. The Stomach energy is very important for a healthy digestive system, and to build immunity. Choose warm foods to support your digestion. The Spleen time is from 9 a.m. to 11 a.m. It is said this is a good time to be focused and utilize your brain power. It is a time to read, study or do work that requires concentration.

From 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. the Qi is concentrated in the Heart, the most important organ in the system. It is time for creativity and doing things that bring you joy. The Qi is in the Small Intestine from 1 p.m. to 3 p.m. when the energy of the day begins to slow down. It is a good time to have a warm lunch and maybe a restorative nap or meditation, in preparation for slowing down for the evening (yin) time. From 3 p.m. to 5 p.m. Qi gets concentrated in the Bladder, and it is a good time to gauge how your own energy is flowing. Often, we start feeling less energized at this time of day; it is a good time for more mundane tasks that are not too demanding.

The Kidneys are said to be replenished from 5 p.m. to 7 p.m. It is important to avoid high intensity exercise or strenuous workouts at this time of day. If possible, exercise and work hard in the morning and unwind and relax in the evening, with a gentle walk or gentle yoga class. From 7 p.m. to 9 p.m. the Qi is flowing through the Pericardium. This is a good time to wind down, spend time with loved ones and eat a light dinner. The San Jiao (or Triple Heater) is considered an extra organ in Chinese medicine that escribes more of a combined organ function. Its Qi is strong between 9 p.m. to 11 p.m., a great time to get into bed and go to sleep.

From 11 p.m. to 1 a.m. the Qi is concentrated in the Gallbladder. It is important to sleep and restore during this time. Any difficulty sleeping at this hour, may indicate one is struggling with making decisions in any aspect of their life. The Liver Qi is strong between 1 a.m. and 3 a.m. Deep sleep at this hour is important to detoxify the body. Waking up during this time usually refers to a Liver imbalance, since in Chinese medicine the Liver is said to processes our emotions. Lastly, the Lungs are energized between 3 a.m. and 5 a.m., a good yin time to still be sleeping. This is said to be a very spiritual time. Grief and sadness are emotions associated with the Lungs. Waking up during this time may be indicate Lung Qi imbalances. If awake during this time, do breathe exercises and meditate to tune and nourish that Lung energy.

The timing of our meals, our social interactions, our work and sleep greatly impact our sleep/wake cycle and have a negative impact out health. Similarly to our circadian rhythm, Chinese medicine offers a time guideline for our day. The Chinese clock helps us understand how to best nurture ourselves and be in flow with life. Due to work and many other life circumstances, it is not always possible to follow the energy clock or our circadian rhythm. Still, one can strive to pay attention to our physical, emotional and spiritual body, and learn to nourish it when we can and in the best way possible, at the best time of day.
